Sample answers:

I put 'a male friend from your father's workplace' in the first and third columns because I would need to show respect to this person. I also put him in the last column because I would probably learn his name when we meet so I could use the shortened title with his name and still be respectful.

I put the customs officer in the first and third column because I wouldn't know his or her name but I would still need to show respect. So in this case, Anda and Bapak/Ibu are appropriate.

I put 'a shopkeeper whose name you know' in both the third and fourth column because it is very respectful to use Ibu/Bapak but if we know the person's name, it is also perfectly acceptable to use Bu (name) / Pak (name).

I put 'our teacher' in the third and fourth column because both Bapak/Ibu and Pak (name) / Bu (name) are acceptable to show respect.

I must show the same level of respect for a next door neighbour who is the same age as my parents as I do for my teacher. I put this person in the third and fourth column because both Bapak/Ibu and Pak (name) / Bu (name) are acceptable to show respect.
